Recorded on July 20, 1976 in German and Low German

Biographical sketch:

- -born about 1902 in the Molotschna
- -lived in St. Petersburg from 1910-18 where his father was a teacher in a Lutheran school
- -had little to do with Mennonites; attended the Lutheran church
- -moved to Berdjansk when the Revolution got out of hand
- -after his father's death he moved to Halbstadt where he completed the equivalent of 1 year University
- -tried to gain permission to travel to Germany to continue studies
- -when the opportunity to emigrate to Canada arose he chose that route of escape out of Russia in 1924
- -first worked on a farm near Kitchener, then several other jobs
- -later settled in Reesor
- -conditions and factors persuaded him to leave in the early 40°s and he settled in the Niagara area
