



SYRINX, an innovative Canadian band, consisting of Moog synthesizer, saxophone, percussion, and various other instruments will be appearing at Lincoln Curling Club during Brock's Winter Carnival. The trio are: John-Wells Cockell, behind the Moog; Doug Pringle, the talented horn player; and Alan Wells on percussion.

The Moog synthesizer is an instrument creating a diversity of electronic sounds. It only looks complicated, composed of four black boxes with a lot of knobs, switches, dials and lights, audio oscillators, mixers, audio amplifiers, and loudspeakers.

Their music as exemplified on their first album, is not involved in one particular field. It is familiar but the Moog synthesizer imposes certain unique formal structures of its own on modern music. With the use of the synthesizer, an evolutionary step into the realm of electronic music has been taken.

Their first album is one of thematic contradictions based upon a contrast of sounds. Some of the cuts are really thick heavy sounds; others are on the lighter side. The artists are improvisors, ready to adapt to their audience and will try whatever 'free sound' the night calls for. Their simple melody and sound grows on you and the music is absolutely dependable. Their sound is generated by the machin (Moog synthesizer) but still retains human rythms which you will find relaxing.

The trio attempts to make it 'real time', not an electronic pulse. Their trip is to make the Moog sound like a man playing a machine, rather than a machine playing aman, and they succeed in it.

On the night of January 16th, let Syrinx introduce you to their new sound created by their Moog synthesizer. See them 1 performing live at the Lincoln Curling Club on the same night as The Perth County Conspiracy all part of Brock's annual Winter Carnival!
