





Brock U's Drama Division has chosen for its February production Oscar Wilde's brilliant comedy of manners, "The Importance of Being Earnest".

Wilde combines a hilariously improbable plot with characters who are most believable when they are most absurd. Each character attempts to get his or her own way by devious means; but the intrigue is both disguised and heightened by witty and graceful dialogue.

Some apparently ridiculous statements have proven to be surprisingly true. Lady Bracknell, the perdonification of snobbery, believes that "the whole theory of modern education is radically unsound . . (it will) probably lead to acts of vio-

lence in Grosvenor Square". This prediction proved to be true in the recent riots outside the American Embassy in London.

For Wilde, who wrote Earnest in 1895, beauty was the most important truth, and a striving after style the surest sign of sincerity. He wrote for a theatre of eloquent speech, elegant costumes and lavish settings.

Designer Warren Hartman has studies photographs of clothes and furnishings of the period and has taken this design a step nearer fantasia with a wild but skillful line drawings of Robert Searle, creator of the incredible Girls of St. Trinians.

This has provided an ideal setting for actors and director to explore the graceful insanity

of the text.' Wilde wrote for an intelligent audience who went to the theatre to be entertained by wit and polish, not to be shocked by vulgarity.


rected in February or March.



"Brand X" is a movie unlike any other that has ever been seen at Brock. It is as much a movie for the 70's as "The Gladiators", but in a completely different way. It is, as director Win Chamberlain says "propaganda for the politics of joy and disorder".

The basic plot outline is simply a day of television programming — the soap operas, talk shows, the quiz programmes, and the commercials. However, each of these is satirized in a riduculous send-up to show its essential banality and at the same time to "advertise the new life style of the counter-culture".

The result is an incredibly funny and brutally satirical film. No institution, no social convention is spared. The attacks are directed by "an acute sense of the absurd". Perhaps more than any other film to date, "Brand X" is a movie for liberated youth. Anyone else is bound to be offended by it, and probably just won't understand it.




