My Ever Dear Marcy

I have sent the Gen Scott to Bordeaux
there to load with wines &c for Norfolk
will get home safe but for myself I would not
cross the ocean in her for all the riches of the
universe – coming out have I often expected never
again to put my foot on dry land therefore
shall not again trust her with my person

I have got a rheumatism that affects me much which I charge to what I underwent in her last winter – it attacks me in spasms in the left hip knee and ankle it will fly from the one to the other like lightning sometime it will make me quite lame- and again wont have it for a week – I have ^tryed every nostrum that that everyone prescribes without relief – I've had a trifling affection of the Bowels but not

not very bad and my appetite is much better than used formerly to be as I live uniformly on eggs for breakfast and Mutton for dinner no supper or tea-

As there are a great number of fine comfortable vessels at Bordeaux I shall choose among them over on board of which I shall be comfortable on the [winter] coast and of which I shall inform you from there – I go from this to Marseilles and from that place shall go by land to Bordeaux – I shall go up in the Constellation with Capt Gordon – I sent you a dress of [Bombazen] by Mr Hamell of Philadelphia with a couple of dresses for my dear Amelia & Mary who I am sure will deserve them 'by their attention to their studies-I shall not be disappointed when I get home in the progress they have made in arethmatic Geography French and Music prepare to their finishing their education which I hate to effect without being ashamed of them

In France for to be admitted into the first boarding schools in Paris they might be already prepared for the fine polish which is there given to female education and which fits the lady for polished lovely in any part of the world – I also sent up Mr Hamel a government bill for L 100 Sterling which I Lieut Nicholson I hope will keep you easy and comfortable while I get home or you hear from me – to contribute by every [?] in my power to your happiness is ^the summit of all my wishes – the end of all my toil to make you happy and blessed with our[?] ofsbring to toil is pleasure

I cannot describe to you the great transport I feel on the receipt of the dear [?] lines I have this moment put into my hands from you dated the 30th June – with an
