<b>Scope and Content:</b>	<p>One printed blank which is filled in with handwriting. Allan McNabb's [various spellings of McNabb] sworn statement that from the 24<sup>th</sup> of June to the 25<sup>th</sup> of December, 1796, he did not have any other place of employment or profit, civil or military under His Majesty besides his allowance of half pay as a Lieutenant of Dragoons in His Majesty's late Regiment of the Queen's Rangers. This document was signed by Allan McNabb; Robert Hamilton, Justice of the Peace and H. Donaldson at Whitehall, London.</p>		
<b>Physical Description / Condition:</b>	One 21 x 17 cm. one sided sheet. The document has been re-backed. There is some slight staining which does not affect text.		
<b>Biographical / Administrative Notes:</b>	<p>Allan McNabb (1758-1830) was a Loyalist and Lieutenant of Dragoons in His Majesty's late Regiment of the Queen's Rangers. He was the son of Captain Robert MacNab, 2<sup>nd</sup> of Dundurn and Mary Stuart. He served under Lieutenant Colonel John Graves Simcoe and saw action in the American Revolution. He was put on half pay and settled in York [Toronto] where he was denied military preferment and a high civil placement. He was married to Anne Nancy (nee Napier) and they had seven children including Sir Allan McNab who was the Premier of Canada from 1854-1856.</p>
