Administrative/ Biographical Sketch:	Sébastien LeClerc (1637-1714) was a well-known French artist who worked as a printmaker, technical draftsman and military engineer. His early career focused on physics, architecture and perspective. He later studied under the renowned painter Charles Le Brun, who encouraged him to focus on engraving. He became so skilled that he was given the position of <i>Graveur du Roi</i> for Louis XIV.
