Administrative/ Biographical Sketch	<p>From 1837 to 1838 Upper and Lower Canada were facing rebellion. In Upper Canada, William Lyon Mackenzie's desire for a truly representative government fueled the rebellion. Eventually most of the rebels were driven out of the province, but this did not prevent them from attempting to gain support from individuals who were harboring them in the United States. The governments of Upper and Lower Canada feared the US government would lend aid in support of the rebels and seize the opportunity to invade Canada once again.</p> <p>The resolution was written in response to what the legislative assembly of Upper Canada considered a breach of neutrality by certain American citizens. The assembly required assurances from the United States government that it had no intention of supporting the insurrection of a few American individuals in supporting the rebels.</p>
